

INFORMATION ABOUT THE COURSE

This course gives an introduction to New Testament Greek, one of the original languages in which the Holy Bible was written. It equips students to look critically at the original language of the New Testament, the writings of the Holy Fathers and the Greek manuscripts instead of being dependent solely on translations into English. This course introduces students to *Koine* Greek elements and explains how to recognise Greek words and grammar constructions. Finally, provides the keys on how students will develop their translation skills of words and New Testament Greek passages into English.

METHOD

The course is divided into 3 terms and each term consists of 10 weeks. The course is delivered through weekly online seminars, tutorials, tasks and exegesis. Students have to complete and submit for evaluation weekly assignments for which they will receive feedback and comments in relation to their development. NT Greek Tutor keeps contact with all students by e-mail and advises on study, comments on assignments and conducts online discussions on the website forum with students on a weekly basis.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the course, it is expected that students will be able to show an understanding of New Testament words and meaning, demonstrate knowledge of the basic vocabulary of the New Testament, show a working understanding of Greek grammar and syntax, read and translate the New Testament from Greek into English and finally, read and understand both *Erasmian* Greek (Academic) and Modern *Koine* Greek, which is currently used by the Greek Orthodox Church in worship and administrative purposes.
